

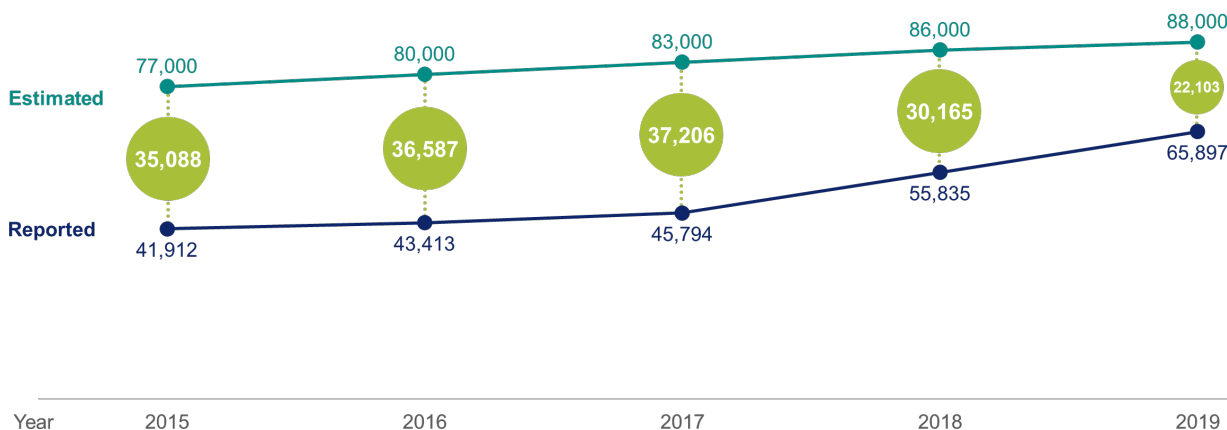
Person Centered Care: Finding Missing TB Cases

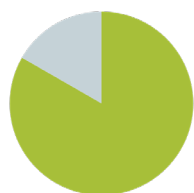
Ensuring the delivery of person-centered care (PCC) is the cornerstone of national TB programs to implement effective services and interventions. The Quality of TB Service Assessments (QTSA) offer an opportunity to evaluate facility practices related to providing PCC and highlight potential target areas for improvement.

WHO TB Database Uganda 2015–2019



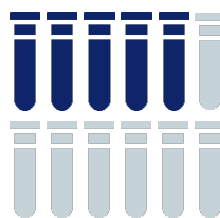
Finding missing TB cases is critical to close the gap between the number of notified cases and the estimated burden of TB. QTSA data illuminates contributing factors to missing TB cases, including a low proportion of facilities utilizing WHO-recommended rapid diagnostics for TB testing and the proportion of facilities that conduct community-level TB screening. Additionally, the QTSA highlights significant gaps between the TB services desired by people with TB compared to the services they received.
